
ROCK MINISTRY



HEALTH NEWS

Summer Greetings to you all!

I hope everyone is enjoying the summer. Take time to relax and enjoy the beauty of God's creation. Summer brings friends and family together to make memories or reminisce about old memories and also a time for exercise such as biking, swimming, walking, or other outdoor activities. Be safe. Always be sure bike helmets, life jackets, and sunscreen are handy and used. I have included a tear out flyer from Church Health Reader about summer skin care and protection.

Safety for our members during church services.

Sometimes sudden changes in positioning such as rising from a lying down position or sitting position to standing, the blood pressure can drop suddenly and the brain is deprived of adequate blood supply. This can lead to dizziness or lightheadedness. Another kind of low blood pressure can occur when someone stands for a long period of time. This can lead to passing out. These types of postural hypotension are considered a failure of the cardiovascular system or nervous system to react appropriately to sudden changes. Normally, when you stand up, some blood pools in your lower extremities. Uncorrected, this would cause your blood pressure to fall. But your body normally compensates by sending messages to your heart to beat faster and to your blood vessels to constrict. This offsets the drop in blood pressure. If this does not happen, or happens to slowly, fainting can occur.

1. To protect yourself from an injury due to fainting, sit during church service particularly if standing is difficult due to weakness, injury or illness.
2. When standing move your legs, keep knees slightly bent. If even slight lightheadedness occurs or you are concerned about how you are feeling, sit down.
3. Be sure you have breakfast with liquids prior to church. Remember you have fasted all night. Your body needs nutrition and fluids for energy.

Our Pastors ask the congregation **“to stand if YOU are able.”** If there is a chance you could fall or faint, **it is OK to sit.**

Remember, fainting may indicate a particular medical condition but fainting is also a common problem particularly for the elderly who may suffer serious injuries from falls when they faint.

Shining a Light on Sunscreen

In recent years, skin cancer has been on the rise, and it has become more important for us to protect our bodies from the sun's harmful rays. But how much do you know about sunscreen and sun protection? While the use of sunscreen on exposed skin as protection is common knowledge, the details sometimes get fuzzy. SUNSCREEN KNOW-HOW FOR YOUR CHURCH

1
The sun's rays include ultraviolet A (UVA) and ultraviolet B (UVB) rays. Sunscreen Sun Protection Factor (SPF) measures the lotion's ability to block UVB rays only. To make sure your sunscreen blocks UVA rays, as well, look for the words "broad spectrum" on your lotion bottle.

2
Sunscreens with zinc oxide are recommended because they block both UVA and UVB rays.

3
Seek shade where available. Keep in mind the sun's rays are usually strongest between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.

4
Water and sand both reflect the sun's damaging rays, so use extra caution when out at the beach.

5
An SPF number does not constitute how many minutes you can be out in the sun. The number designates the length of time you can be out in the sun before you get sunburned. For example, an SPF of 30 means you can be out in the sun 30 times longer than if you had no sunscreen on without getting burned.

6
For the sunscreen to be effective, you need to use an ounce for exposed areas.

7
Use sunscreen every day you're outside, year-round. Even on cloudy days, the sun's rays can pierce through with up to 80 percent efficacy.

8
Typically, an adult should use a water-resistant, broad spectrum, SPF 30 or higher sunscreen and reapply every two hours or so.

QUILTING CORNER: Read to solve the mystery.

What is the mystery, you ask? Read on. Discover the *Why, What, Who, Where, and How* about quilting.

WHY:

To provide quilts to people in the world who have suffered natural or human made disasters. Lutheran World Relief began this particular Christian act of charity in the 1940's and is still going strong. But WHY do individuals do this work? The Mountain View Lutheran Church Quilters have as many reasons as there are volunteers. Perhaps the core reason is to provide a physical expression of God's love to people in need, no matter the color, creed or political beliefs. To know a little time, "scraps" of material, and short congenial meetings are all put together like the quilts, to show we care.

WHAT:

This is the easiest question. The "what" is the product: the Quilts!

WHO:

Currently nine or more women meet every Wednesday (9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.) in the basement of the Chapel, except for July and August!. (Everyone needs a vacation!) There are ways to support the quilt effort without coming to the "putting the quilts together and tying gathering." One member, at home, sews over 60-90 quilt tops each year! This is a *very* big help. Others purchase material, or sewing notions, or boxes/tape (for packaging the quilts) at garage sales or stores or thrift stores. Others donate items from recently deceased loved ones or who need to move to another residence and cannot take items they may have collected for years. (Read the footnote below.)

WHERE:

Described already. But this is the important part. If you are unable to attend the Wednesday "put the quilts" together meeting you can still help, as described under "who." If you have an artistic bent take 2-3 hours a week at home to sew quilt tops. Be as free in your expression as you choose! If you are a person seeking a few hours of contemplation a week sewing quilt tops allows you minutes to think while producing a colorful and functional product. I sew quilt tops at home and while I sew I think of the people who will use our quilts, where they are, who they are and what the quilts mean to them. I find solace and love in a world needing peace and sewing quilt tops provides those to me. Give it a try.

HOW:

FOOTNOTE:

Donating material is HUGE! Recently some of the quilters went to a material store and "Holy cow!" material is expensive. And quilts take a lot of material for tops and backs and batting! So, all help is a big help.

It is hard to believe that we are almost to the end of another Summer! If you have been on campus on a Thursday, you no doubt have noticed the Honey Doers hard at work with several projects to help keep our campus in tip top shape! This Summer, the Honey Doers, under the leadership of Dan Neptun, repainted the entire inside of the classroom portion of the Education Building. Additionally, the Honey Doers repainted the exterior doors on the Community Center and Food Bank and are touching up the paint on the exterior of the Chapel. Thank you to the many willing hands that made this work possible: John Dahle, Dave Gray, Wes Grenlund, Rich Hanenburg, Bill Hansen, Jay Holland, Gary Larson, Lindy Nelson, Dan Neptun, Jeff Quinn, John Simonson, and Terry Wolfe!

Summer has been an exceptionally busy time in the Church Office as well! Pastor John completed his sabbatical at the end of July. Prior to vacation, several projects were scheduled, to ensure completion before Gathering Day: 1) replacement of several leaky fire sprinkler heads in the Community Center and Food Bank; 2) the transition to the cloud-based servers; 3) the outside financial review of 2017 and 2018 finances; and 4) completing June month-end and 2nd Quarter Giving Statements. I also attended the Church Network's annual conference in Charlotte, NC in mid-July. Each year, church administrators from all around the country gather to learn about new ways to steward God's resources, to equip our congregations and facilities to do His work. This year's conference focused on Building on Our Foundation. I attended workshops on Finances, Church Information Technology, and a couple on Church Facilities. One workshop focused on Designated Funds: whether to allow them, and how to clearly communicate the activity to fully reflect the total Ministry & Mission of the congregation. This will be a conversation with the Finance Committee and our outside accounting firm.

Next up: the development of the 2020 Spending Guideline.

General Fund Giving Update

June was a strong giving month, with income exceeding expected giving by \$3,734. We continue to be close to year-to-date expected giving levels YTD, at more than 98.25%. Giving during the four Sundays of July continues to be strong and has helped us stay close to expected giving amounts. We are just over \$19,000 below the giving levels needed to stay on track for the year. Giving overall continues to be faithful and consistent across the congregation as a whole and is still up about 2.16% compared with last year.

We ask for your continued faithful financial support as we move into summer—a time when we typically incur greater expenses on the facility to perform annual maintenance that cannot take place when Rock Ministry and other programs are still running.
